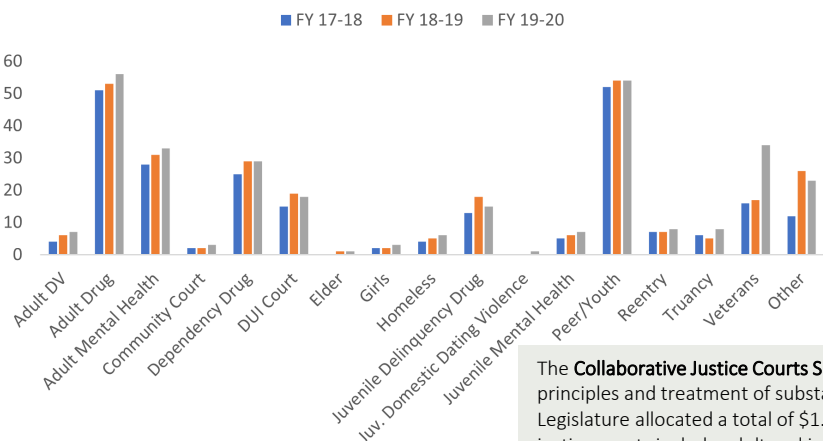

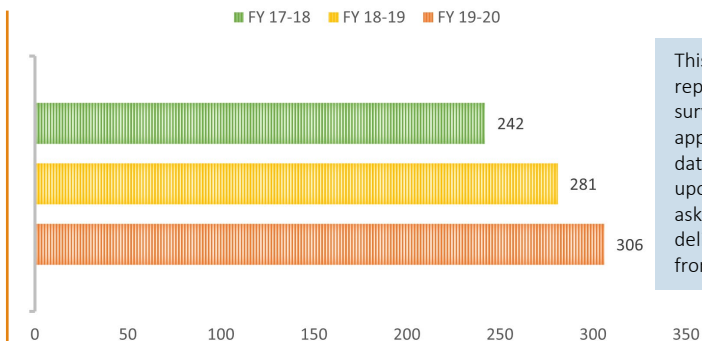

2. # OF TOTAL SAFG-FUNDED COLLABORATIVE COURTS

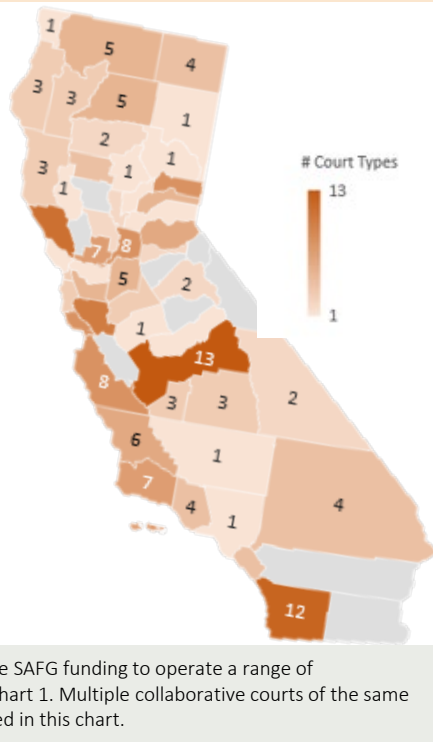
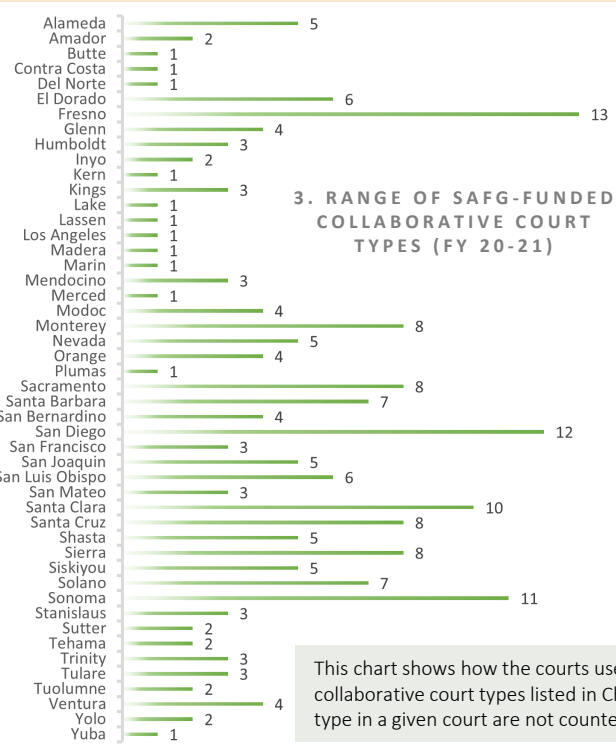


This infographic relies upon data reported in grant deliverable surveys and SAFG grant applications. The availability of data for each graph varies based upon the specific data elements asked for in each year's grant deliverables. FY 20/21 data is from the grant application only.

The Collaborative Justice Courts Substance Abuse Focus Grant Program is designed to promote innovation and to assist courts in using drug court principles and treatment of substance abuse and related issues in the context of collaborative justice courts. As part of the Budget Act of 2020, the Legislature allocated a total of \$1.16 million for California to maintain, expand, or enhance collaborative courts. Examples of eligible collaborative justice courts include adult and juvenile drug courts, adult and juvenile mental health courts, dependency and family law drug courts, DUI courts, elder courts, homeless courts, juvenile delinquency drug courts, peer/youth courts, reentry courts, truancy courts, veterans courts, community courts, girls courts and other collaborative justice courts that have a substance abuse focus.

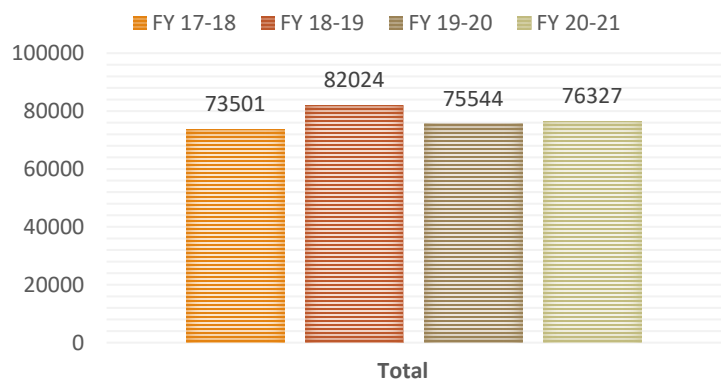


RANGE OF SAFG-FUNDED COLLABORATIVE COURT TYPES & TOTAL PARTICIPANTS

4. ESTIMATED # OF PARTICIPANTS IN SAFG-FUNDED COLLABORATIVE COURTS

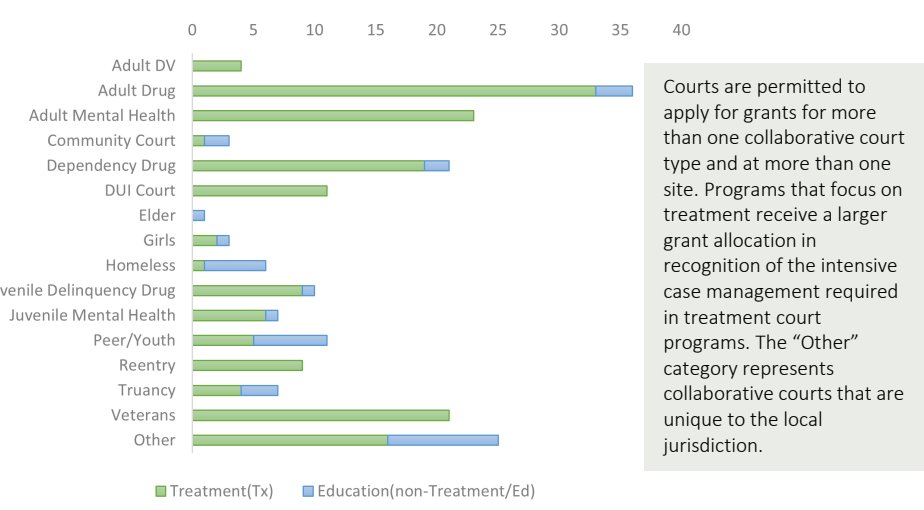


This chart includes estimated participants from FY 2020-21, pulled from the grant application submitted by the courts.



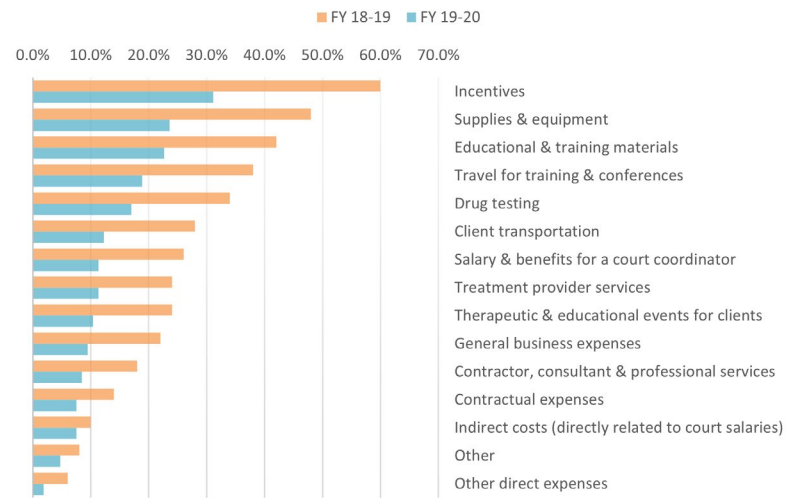
SAFG-FUNDED TREATMENT & EDUCATION PROGRAMS OVERVIEW & USE OF FUNDS

5. BREAKDOWN OF TREATMENT & EDUCATION PROGRAMS BY SAFG-FUNDED COLLABORATIVE COURT TYPE (FY 20-21)



Courts are permitted to apply for grants for more than one collaborative court type and at more than one site. Programs that focus on treatment receive a larger grant allocation in recognition of the intensive case management required in treatment court programs. The "Other" category represents collaborative courts that are unique to the local jurisdiction.
